KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

EVERY AMERICAN HAS THE RIGHT TO:

- Travel with cash. It is legal to possess and travel with any amount of cash. However, if you are departing or entering the United States with more than \$10,000, you are required to report it to U.S. Customs.
- Refuse a warrantless search. Never consent to a search of your car, home, person, or belongings and insist that law enforcement first obtain a warrant. Exception: Airports and government buildings may search for weapons at entry.
- Remain silent. Don't fall victim to high-pressure tactics such as aggressive and confusing questioning. You do not have to speak to police without an attorney present.

IF YOUR PROPERTY IS SEIZED:

- Do not sign a waiver. Refuse to sign any waiver or other agreement "giving" your property to law enforcement during a traffic stop or other encounter.
- Demand a receipt. Be sure to get a property receipt from law enforcement listing everything that was taken from you.
- Report abuse immediately at <u>ij.org/report-abuse</u>.
